

## RESULTS

### 1. All Post-M.D. Trainees

The number of International Medical Graduates who were Canadian citizens in Canadian post-M.D. training programs **decreased** from 750 to 385 over the last 11 years.

(The number of Visa trainee residents has increased from 508 to 742.)

### 2. First Year Trainees

In 2002, we see an **increase** in the number of International Medical Graduates (Canadian citizens) entering training (first year trainees) from a low of 58 in 1994 to 138 in 2001.

The number of Graduates of Canadian Medical Schools has decreased over this time from 1666 to 1443 (13% decrease).

### 3. Field of Training

As the proportion of Graduates of Canadian Medical Schools choosing **Family Medicine** has **decreased** from 53% to 40%, the proportion of International Medical Graduates (Canadian citizens) has increased from 22% to 33%.

### 4. Gender

There is a slightly higher proportion of men in the International Medical Graduate cohort than in the Graduates of Canadian Medical School group.

M.D. Canada:                      52% male              48% female

M.D. outside Canada:        55% male              45% female

(Canadian citizens)

### 5. Age

International Medical Graduates are older than Graduates of Canadian Medical Schools when they complete training.

Average age:

Graduates of Canadian Medical Schools - 30yrs.

International Medical Graduates              - 39 yrs.

### 6. Proportion of workforce compared to trainees

International Medical Graduates (Canadian citizens) were 9% of first year trainees.

In the Canadian workforce, International Medical Graduates form 23% of the workforce ranging from 47% in Newfoundland and 55% in Saskatchewan to 11% in Quebec.
